The Shibusawa Memorial Museum is celebrating thirty years of sharing the life of Shibusawa Eiichi, the man who built the foundations of a modern economic society in Japan.

This fall the Shibusawa Memorial Museum (in Asukayama Park, Nishigahara, Kita City, Tokyo) will hold a special exhibition, "Rediscover Shibusawa Eiichi: The History of the Shibusawa Memorial Museum and Masterpieces from the Collections" to celebrate the thirtieth anniversary of the Museum. The Shibusawa Memorial Museum was opened in 1982 to share the achievements and ideals of Shibusawa Eiichi to a wide audience. The special exhibit will showcase records and other items from past exhibits and outreach activities as well as masterpieces from the Museum's collections chosen in response to visitors' questions such as "Who did Eiichi look up to?" "Who were Eiichi's friends and acquaintances?" "What types of connections did Eiichi have with which companies?" "What were Eiichi's favorite items?" We hope the exhibition will both provide the opportunity to "re-discover" Shibusawa Eiichi and create interest in the future of the Shibusawa Memorial Museum.
